#### **Interesting Wire Jewelry Facts**

Creating wire jewelry is an ancient craft. Beautiful gold wire necklaces have been discovered in ancient Egyptian burial chambers dating back as far as 3000 B.C., and we know that the Assyrians and Babylonians also made wire jewelry around 1700 B.C.

It is believed that these ancient craftsmen created wire by chiseling thin strips from sheet metal. The strips were either twisted around cylindrical mandrels or rolled between two flat surfaces, such as rocks, to smooth them for use in jewelry.

The United States imported its wire from the United Kingdom and Germany until 1812, when the war meant that supplies were cut off. From this point, the Americans began building their own factories for producing wire and by the mid-nineteenth century, wire was being made into many household products, as well as jewelry.

Wire's popularity gradually diminished with the advent of plastic, although in recent years wire work has enjoyed a renaissance, with craft and hobby industry suppliers producing colored wires in every tone and gauge.
