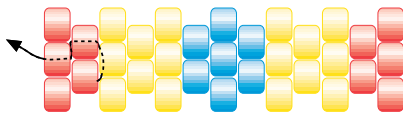

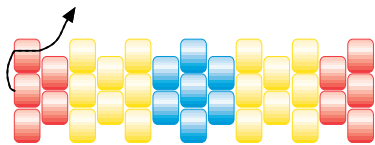

Row 5 and every odd-numbered row: Weave across the row adding 1R, 1Y, 1Y, 1B, 1Y, and 1Y. Pick up 1R, even though there is no bead to anchor it. Slide the new R down to the work. Make a U-turn and pass back through the bead below the new R and the next one diagonally (Figure 5). Change direction by entering the bead above this one and down the next one, diagonally (Figure 6). Change direction once again. Pass through the bead above (the new R), positioning the needle so it is ready to weave across the row (Figure 7).

Weave 20 rows and stop.

4 Zip up tube. Roll the first row up to meet the last row and weave it seamlessly (see page 24). Weave in the thread and tail, making half hitches.

Double-Needle Method

Did you notice while weaving the single-needle sample that every other row requires the anchoring maneuver? All those extra thread passes occur along the same edge of the work. Although the
